

Robert McCulloch is named in a variety of sources as a patriot wounded at Kings Mountain. He is not listed on the 1909 monument plaque. Lewis Preston Summers had no sort feature with his spreadsheet software, LOL. In *Annals of Southwest Virginia*, Summers has a chart of soldiers shown in chunks of near alphabetic order. A good historical research project would be to find his various source manuscripts and enter them into computer charts for merger and sort. Meanwhile, his lists are more than suspect.

Summers lists **Robert McCulloch** as wounded at Kings Mountain. Thomas McCulloch is listed twice and John McCulloch once.

1st Lt Thomas McCulloch is listed on the 1909 BKM obelisk plaque as mortally wounded. Sometimes spelled McCulloch in Washington County records, the family also used McCullough. His son John used McCulloch in his pension declaration. S7204

Samuel Newell did name Thomas McCulloch as mortally wounded, but did not mention Robert McCulloch while attempting to recall all the casualties from his Virginia battalion..

04Nov1780 Washington County, in the will of Thomas McCulloch, widow Isabel, and sons John and **Robert** are named..

The McCulloch's lived north of Abingdon across the ridge on N Fork of Holston.

John McCulloch was on 1782 personal property tax list.

John McCulloch, son of Thomas, was also at BKM and told about his father dying in his pension declaration. He did not mention his brother being there or being wounded.
