

William Teas joined the Virginia Cavalry Regiment of Colonel William Washington from Amherst County (later Nelson County) and served as Cornet during the Southern Campaign of the Revolutionary War. In late 1832, a number of south central Virginia veterans testified in behalf of the pension application (FPA W1663) of widow Sarah Loving Teas.

During the years after the war, William Teas often carried an officer's sword. It was a broadly known fact that William Teas had two wounds received in battle, **a sabre cut on the hand and a bullet wound to the leg**. Eyewitness veterans placed Teas at the battles of **Cowpens**, Guilford Courthouse, and Eutaw Springs. It is quite possible that one of the wounds happened at the Cowpens.

Sarah Loving married William Teas in Amherst County VA on 21Jul1798. William died in 1824.
