Grace Greenlee Bowman McDowell carried charcoal from her fireplace to a cave where her husband manufactured gunpowder. After her husband, John Bowman, was killed at the battle of Ramseur's Mill, "Grizzie" tended to wounded militia at their Morganton NC plantation. She migrated from Rockbridge County (Liberty Hall, W&L Univ) with her brothers both of whom served as Burke County sheriff.

Col William Graham built a fort in the center of old Tryon County on Buffalo Creek near Broad River. His "South Fork Boys" militia lived nearest to the Kings Mountain battlefield. As the patriots were approaching Ferguson's encampment, he was called away, and command devolved to Lt Col Frederick Hambright who owned land at the SW end of Kings Mountain. Hambright passed command on to Major William Chronicle who had a deer hunting camp on the ridge. On the day after the battle, the procession paused at Graham's Fort for the burial ceremony for Col James Williams.

McDowell, Joseph Both Col. Charles McDowell's brother Joseph and his cousin Joseph lived on the Catawba River near Greenlee's Ford in Burke County and both were in the battle of Kings Mountain. When Charles went to Hillsborough to see the governor, brother Joseph took command of the Burke County militia..

The McDowell clan migrated from Winchester VA to then Rowan County. Joseph of Quaker Meadows was in college at Liberty Hall (W&L Univ + VMI) with Samuel Newell and several other patriots in the Battle of Kings Mountain.

Dr. William McLean placed the first monument at Kings Mountain for four South Fork Boys who were killed in the battle, **Major William Chronicle, Captain John Mattocks, William Rabb, and John Boyd**. Erected in 1814, it is the second oldest revolutionary battlefield monument after Lexington Green. Eroded by wear of weather, the monument became hardly readable, so a second durable inscribed stone was placed beside it

William Walker son of Col John Walker, Brother of Rep Felix Walker. lived at the confluence of Cane Creek and Broad River.
